2019 Highlights

District Headquarters Purchase

The District purchased its Garfield Heights facility which includes the office and the warehouse used as the Special Waste Convenience Center. The purchase will reduce future space costs and create new programming opportunities.



NEW "Wishcycler" Videos Working with TRG Multimedia and KC Media Partners, the District developed a new advertising campaign to address recycling contamination. The series of videos use humor to highlight improper recycling by portraying a

fictional "wishcycling" center where two recycling experts create odd objects from items people "wish" could be recycled but cannot. A grant from Ohio EPA funded the project.

Staffing Changes We welcomed Carin Miller as our new Education Specialist after Kathleen Rocco resigned to become the director of the Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca Solid Waste District. Jessica Fenos was promoted to Assistant Director and Cristie Snyder took on the role of Communications Specialist. We also recently hired Matt Walters as our Recycling Programs Coordinator. Solid Waste Plan Ratified

The five-year update of the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste Management Plan was ratified by each community in Cuyahoga County and the Ohio EPA in the summer of 2019. Plan implementation began in November. A copy is available on our website.


The District was formed out of Ohio solid waste law, passed in 1988 by the Ohio legislature. The goal of that law was, and is, to create a statewide waste management system that reduces reliance on landfills, increases waste reduction and recycling and ensures adequate disposal capacity.

Over the years, we have had the pleasure of working with municipal and community leaders, individuals, teachers and businesses who share our passion for recycling, composting and waste reduction. We are part of a large community that understands the importance of resource conservation, greenhouse gas reduction, energy savings and the economic benefits of responsible waste management. Our work is fun and rewarding thanks to you.

2019 brought some challenges with the market restrictions resulting from the China Sword Policy. Recycling prices fell and the economics of recycling changed. This affected our local recycling companies and the customers they serve. We are still seeing the market impacts, but we also see cities and businesses committed to keeping their recycling programs in place despite the added cost. That is commitment and the District is committed leading our community through this time. We promise to stay on top of all the changes, communicate them and develop strategies and solutions to serve you.

% Recycled

The percentage of a community's total residential waste stream that is collected for recycling through curbside, drop-off and special waste recycling programs. Includes cartons, cardboard, glass, paper, plastic, scrap metal, appliances, computers, household hazardous wastes and scrap tires.


% Composted

The percentage of a community's total residential waste stream that is diverted from landfilling by chipping, mulching and composting programs. Includes yard waste, leaves, grass, brush and wood waste.

2019 Residential Recycling Report

This data reflects materials collected through each community's residential waste collection, recycling and yard waste management programs. It excludes materials from commercial buildings, retail stores, restaurants and apartment complexes that are not served by the community's waste collection program.

2019 Tons Landfilled Solid Waste =

Consists of non-recycled trash that is taken to a landfill for disposal.

2019 Tons Recycled Recyclables =

Consists of cans, cartons, glass, paper and boxes, plastic bottles and jugs, scrap metal, appliances, computers, household hazardous waste and scrap tires that are collected for recycling in the community.

2019 Tons Recycled Organics =

Consists of yard waste, leaves, grass, brush and wood collected for mulching and/or composting in the community.

2019 Total

Recycling Rate = The percentage of residential waste diverted from landfills through the community's reuse, recycling and composting programs. The recycling rate is calculated by dividing the total tons recycled (organics + recyclables) by the total tons of waste generated (tons landfilled + tons recycled).
