THE DIGITAL WORLD Lost & digitally found

This is part of the series on privacy in the digital world

n old friend of mine, who has a type B personality, was anything but calm when he called me one sweltering day last summer. So much so that I thought he was involved in an accident ... or worse. I could guess only every other word he was ratiling off at the speed of sound.

When I could finally interject, I told him to call me back on the Duo app I had taught him to use (instead of FaceTime) since I have an Android phone. I figured the added "visuals" of a video meeting app will help calm him down faster than just audio. But he couldn't call me back using the Duo app. The reason for his panic, and the reason he couldn't call me back using Duo, was because he had lost/misplaced his new \$1,000+ iPhone while vacationing abroad!

Before he left for vacation, I had a beer (or three) with him at our hut so I can share tips when traveling abroad. For example, a tip to minimize surprise surcharges when communicating back stateside from abroad and making sure he had the correct (Cloud Photo settings on his IPhone so his mischief, err "fun," can be preserved.

One thing I always check, and actually it's on my checklist for setting up new smartphones/tablets, is to confirm that "Find My iPhone" is turned ON in the Settings app. Sure, it is not 100% foolproof but this feature greatly increases the chance of zeroing-in on the location of your iPhone/IPad that is AWOL.

Pro tip: when setting up an lPhone/IPad, it is recommended to additionally add a trusted cell number (that is not yours but of someone you trust) to your Apple ID profile so they can receive verification codes for the required two-factor authentication, "2FA" for short, explained below.

Since I set up his new iPhone, I already knew he had another trusted cell number listed. I also knew that he had no other Apple devices registered under the same Apple ID used by his missing Phone, hence the verification code must be sent to the alternate cell number.

I started a browser on my Windows laptop typed in icloud com/find, provided his Apple ID, typed in his credential, and provided the verification code from 2FA, After a few seconds, up came the map and the location of where his IPhone last checked-in with Apple. Prom this clue, I told him to look everywhere in his room as his iPhone on the map was superimposed at the location of the hotel he is staying at the resort.


The same functionality, "Find my Device," is available for Android-based smartphones/tablets at google.com/android/find and, similar to how the Apple version works, this one uses the Google Account used by the lost Android-based phone you are trying to locate instead.

Having a greater chance to find your lost device is a privacy compromise worth making in my onin-Ion. He found it stuck in between lovesent cushions and was able to enjoy the rest of his vacation. ●

THE MEDICAL INSIDER A secret to better transgender youth health

Tanet was a Cleveland schoulteacher for decades. Now happily retired, she blogs about her rural life in Pennsylvania, quilt hearts, town council, surprise bear visits, and her three rescued barn cats. Given the transgender clebate, she shares her stories. STORY 41: A SELF-PORTRAIT

I helped a first-grade boy with beginning reading in the late '90s. If is parents told his teacher that he talked about wanting to be a girl. The teacher shared that with staff who worked with him so that we could support him if he needed us, but he didn't talk about his feelings at school.

For an art project, the art teacher traced each child's full body outline, and the children colored their portraits with crayons. Afterward the classroom teacher wrote names on the portraits to hang them in the room.

She brought one to me. "Can you guess who this is?" I started at a girl in a detailed (rilly, pink dress, The child had taken great care and pride with that drawing. It was the little boy I was teaching to read, of course. The teacher rolled the portrait up, secured it with a rubber band, and said instead of hanging the portraits in the room this year, she would send all the portraits home.

STORY #2: MISSING BODY PART

I worked with a girl in the early 2000s. Her foster mother told the teacher and me at a conference that the girl had asked when she would get her penis. The worker hadn't thought much about it at first because all the other children in the home were boys, but the girl kept asking.

The foster mother realized there was more to the child's question. She grew up with boys as her friends - dressing and acting like them. Children considered her a "tom boy."

When the sixth-graders prepared to go to Williamsburg, the teacher asked me whether he should puther in a girls' or boys' motel norm. J asked which bathroom she used at school. The classroom assistant answered the girls' room, so I advised putting her in a room with girls. The mother's plan was to move if the child needed a transition so her new friends would only know her as him.

fanct said, "In those days, we accepted the children but protected them. Dark ages maybe..." Today, doctors still have much to learn about

transgender medicine. What we know, transgender is not a disorder. What's very alarming is the extent of depression, anxiety, stress. Data showed eight in 10 transgender individuals contemplate suicide while four in 10 have attempted it.

An important predictor for mental health is the support and acceptance from family, schools, and peers. A University of Washington study showed among socially supported transgender children, their rate of depression was no higher than their peers.

So color me optimistic. We can be the problem or the solution. It costs us nothing to call a child by their preferred pronoun. Even if we don't consistently get it right, let's show them that we care and try.



Covid will not return. Did our "digital world" go through as drastic of a change as our real world during the past two years? I think we can all agree that during the pandemic, our reliance on the digital world services and tools were exacerbated profoundly. Digital literacy as a 21st century life-skill was underscored in a dramatic manner as it became a suitable solution to a formidable health issue and other systemic societal challenges that Covid was indirectly responsible for.

It is often cited in the popular media that cable TV and satelifie TV operators continue to lose subscribers to streaming services in what is known as "cutting the cord." Online banking not only saves money by not needing to buy stamps or physical checks to pay bills but it is now considered a safer method to pay bills due to the increased vandallsm of mailboxes out on the streets. When checks fall into the hands of these miscreants, your finances or identity is at risk due to the checks having the bank routing number and account number.

My opinion is that our digital world hasn't changed as drastically as our real world has in the past two years. Rather, the value of the digital world, namely its tools and services, continued to increase. That translates to the importance of embracing digital literacy so one can use said tools and services to elevate their quality-of-life during normal times, have options in getting things done even under duress, and be in a better readiness state for future pandemics that may again limit our mobility and/or social connectedness. I consider the latter limitation a systemic condition that is unfortunately a byproduct of physical distance ing - a solution that proved its efficacy in minimizing the risk of getting Covid - that may once again become necessary during a pandemic 🔍



Update to Westlake Porter Public Library renovations

Public Library held a ceremony on Monday, Sept. 24, to commemorate the groundbreaking of its new outdoor ing pavilion and programn the refurbishing of study and collaborative spaces in its Adult Services section. Site work has begun

on the approximately 2,000-square-foot outdoor programming pavilion which will provide additional space for all types of programming and events Improvements to the Adult Services area include remodeling three existing study rooms, adding two new small group study rooms which can accommodate up to four people each improved lighting, new carpet, and new furnishings. Both projects are expected to be completed by mid-November of this year.

The projects are a result of a strategic and space planning process the library completed in 2021, including feedback solicited from the community during public sessions and through surveys. The construction costs of approximately \$900.000 will be paid for from the library's Permanent Improvement Fund, which are funds specifically set aside for projects such as these, and \$110,000 received in donations, including

a generous contribution toward the pavilion from the Friends of Porter Public Library in honor of their 50th anniversary.

The library previously announced that the cost of the Adult Services area renovation was to be offset by donations from two donors. However, one of the donors rescinded their donation due to a naming rights matter that could not

be resolved. "While we are disappointed to have lost a generous donation, we remain committed to the upgrades and improvements to the library and will continue to look for ways to offset the renovation costs," said library Director Andrew Mangels,

Other projects the library is working on this fail include converting the former café into a makerspace and opening the second floor to the public: A dedicated makerspace will bring together the library's collection of maker resources, including the 3D printers and file transfer machines (VHS films and slides into digital format) as well as adding new services such as an A/V recording booth and equipment for craft cutting and making custom T-shirts Project updates and





- Any larger household remodeling or third party projects require a dumpster rental.
- DIY smaller projects can be brought to the Service Dept. / NO CONTRACTORS / VALID PROOF OF RESIDENCY IS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS.

You can Drop Off Additional Bulk items at the Service Garage during regular scheduled Drop Off hours.

Rubbish outside any household may be Subject to Fines per City Ordinance.



5 Ways to Recycle Right.

- Leave recyclables loose not bagged. Plastic bags do not belong in your recycling bin or cart. Plastic bags get tangled in the sorting machines at the recycling facilities and cause major problems for the recycling process. Plastic shopping bags can be recycled at many retail locations, including Giant Eagle, Lowe's Home Improvement, Marc's, Target and Walmart stores.
- Make sure it's clean and empty. Rinse residue from cartons, containers, bottles and jars or any other recyclable that may contain food particles. For example, greasy pizza boxes are not accepted.
- Keep it dry. When it comes to paper and cardboard, keeping it dry is imperative for the recycling process. Please flatten all cardboard boxes as well.
- Don't Wishcycle. Think you can throw everything into your recycling bin and it will get sorted out at the recycling plant? Think again. Recycling only these five core items is paramount: cans, cartons, glass bottles and jars, paper and boxes along with plastic bottles and jugs. See www.cuyahogarecycles.org/how_to_recycle

City of Brook Park Rubbish Collection Rules & Regulations

The City of Brook Park provides curb side collection to residential homes and condominiums. This service includes a weekly collection of household rubbish and provides an alternating week of recyclable collection. All waste material must be separated and prepared in accordance with the following rules and regulations:

- YOU MUST PLACE your household trash on the curb in City approved containers. All homes will be issued rubbish and recycling containers that are the property of the City of Brook Park. One (1) 95 gallon black container will be issued for garbage and one (1) 95 gallon blue container will be issued for recyclables. YOU ARE NOT PERMITTED TO PAINT YOUR NAME, ADDRESS OR ANYTHING ON CITY OWNED CONTAINERS. All rubbish must be placed inside the City approved containers. Rubbish will not be collected if not in approved containers. Do not place rubbish in recycling containers. DO NOT OVER FILL CONTAINERS.
- ALL OTHER CONTAINERS such as standard plastic, galvanized cans or laundry baskets are not acceptable and will not be emptied.
- PLEASE BAG ALL RUBBISH, secure the bag with a tie and place in your 95 gallon rubbish container.
- 4. DO NOT PLACE your City container on the curb prior to 5 p.m. the day before collection or later than 5 a.m. on the day of collection.
- HAVE YOUR CITY TRASH and recycle containers at least 3 ft. apart, side by side along the curb so that the truck's mechanical arm can lift with ease to avoid obstructions. Other obstructions to avoid are fire hydrants, trees, telephone poles and signs.
- EMPTY CONTAINERS must be removed from the tree lawn, no later than 24 hours after they have been emptied.
- 7. THE FOLLOWING MATERIALS will not be collected: earth, rocks, broken concrete or materials left by a contractor.
- TIRES are not accepted. Please call the Service Department at 216-433-7189 for disposal options.
- Fall Leaf Program: will begin in Mid-October thru Mid-December and will end at Service Directors good judgement and/or weather permitting. LEAVES should be placed on the tree lawn for vacuum collection... It is illegal to place leaves in the street.

- YARD WASTE grass clippings and or bundled branches are not a Bulk item. They can however be dropped off at the Service Dept. Hours of operation are M-F 8:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m., Saturday 9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.
- DO NOT PLACE PAINT IN RUBBISH OR RECYCLING CONTAINERS. All oil based paint must be dropped off at the Service Garage, 19065 Holland Road during working hours, Monday – Friday, 7:30 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.
- 12. HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE poisons or any material of any toxic nature are to be dropped off at the Service Garage during working hours, Monday – Friday, 7:30 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.
- **13.** OFFICIAL HOLIDAYS: There is no Rubbish collection on City holidays. When a holiday falls on your scheduled collection day (Tuesday thru Friday), all collections for that day (garbage, recyclables will be cancelled and collected the following day. All collections for the remainder of that particular week are delayed for one day.
- 14. MONTHLY BULK PICK-UP PROGRAM. On the second (full week) of each month, on your scheduled rubbish day residents will be able to place FIVE bulk items on their tree lawn. These weeks are highlighted on the yearly calendar. The following are acceptable bulk items: dressers, mattresses/box springs (in mattress bags), couches, recliners, bookcases, household doors, storm doors, storm windows, bicycles, basketball hoops (dismantled), fluorescent light bulbs, televisions and appliances. Carpeting must be bundled/rolled and tied, no longer that 4 ft. long and weighing no more than 50 lbs. .
- 15. LARGE CARDBOARD BOXES are not a curb side recycle item. Please utilize drop off locations; West End Fire Station, Aerospace Pump Station, Building Department, Service Garage, Recreation Center, American Legion Park and the Waterpark.
- 16. For the health and safety of Service Dept. laborers and their families; all Mattresses and Box Springs must be placed in zipped or taped up mattress bags. These bags can be purchased at U-Haul and home improvement stores.

AUTOMATED RUBBISH HOT LINE 216-433-7189

The purpose of these rules and regulations is to provide efficient service for our residents at the lowest cost. Practical reasons exist for the limitations listed. For example; weight and size limits are imposed as a safety measure for our employees and also due to the size of opening on our collection truck.

Q1. Why is recycling important?

When you recycle, your used items get a new life. Some materials can travel through the recycling process and be back on store shelves in as little as 30 days! Your aluminum cans, cartons, paper, plastic water bottles and cereal boxes can become many different things.

Additionally, recycling conserves land and natural resources. When you recycle, you keep materials out of landfills where they do not decompose. Instead, you are sending them to a recycling facility to be turned into something useful. Products made with recyclable material use fewer natural resources and energy, making recycling a sustainable activity that also supports local jobs. Recycling is good for the earth and the people who live here now and in the future! Everything cannot be recycled, so you should always consider reducing and reusing first. If you don't generate the waste to begin with, you don't have to decide how to dispose of it.

Q2. Why do recycling rules change?

Recycling is an industry fueled by environmental responsibility but driven by economics. Recycling rules change over time because recyclables are commodities that are sold and traded throughout the world and subject to market fluctuations.

The economics of recycling are rarely discussed but are at the center of the issue of recyclability. Currently supply exceeds demand mainly because of recent restrictions China has placed on the materials they will import. China is tired of being the world's dumping ground and now demands cleaner, sorted recyclables which they use to produce the goods we buy here at home.

Q3. Is that why the rules for recycling in Cuyahoga County were updated?

People are often confused about what can and cannot be recycled. The rules for recycling have been updated to make them easier to understand. Simply put, there are five core items that you should recycle curbside – no matter where you live in Cuyahoga County – include cans, cartons, glass, paper and boxes along with plastic bottles and jugs. These items should be emptied and rinsed with the caps put back on and then placed loose, not bagged, into your recycling container.

Not all plastics are recyclable, so part of the campaign helps residents understand which plastics should be included. We no longer refer to the number on the container, because not all numbered items can be recycled. Now we talk about the shape of the container. If it's shaped like a bottle or jug and has a neck, or a cap, it can be recycled curbside.

Other plastics like Styrofoam[™], plastic cups and utensils, takeout containers and clamshells for lettuce and berries cannot be recycled curbside. Please see Q9 below for more information about plastics.

Helping Cuyahoga County residents understand what things should be recycled curbside versus what should be recycled through other methods is a main message of the District's Recycle More, Recycle Better campaign. Always refer to <u>CuyahogaRecycles.org/recyclein/</u> <u>Brook-Park</u> for the most updated information.

Q4. What happens to my recyclables once they are picked up?

Whether your recycling is picked up by your city or a private company, recyclables from Cuyahoga County go to one of three Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs) in the area. Each MRF is owned and operated by a private company (Kimble Co. in Twinsburg, Republic Services in Oberlin and Waste Management in Akron). Each MRF accepts, sorts and processes tons of recyclables every day. All of these facilities accept metal cans, cartons, glass bottles and jars, mixed paper and cardboard, along with plastic bottles and jugs.

A MRF is a large sorting facility with many conveyor belts and machinery. Here, recycling trucks are weighed before tipping their loads on the building floor. Mixed recyclables are then scooped up by a front-end loader and placed on the sorting line. Large objects and contamination are removed first. The recyclables then travel through an automated sorting system which uses a disk screen, magnets, optical sorters and workers on the line to separate the materials.

The sorted materials are baled and sold to manufacturers who make them into a variety of new products. For instance, your cereal boxes may become a game board or paper towels. Your aluminum cans may become new soda cans or airplane parts. Glass bottles may become kitchen tiles and your soup cans may become new bikes or even a bridge. The cycle is endless.

Q5. What if residents put the wrong things in their recycling? What happens then?

If you put items in your recycling that are not accepted for recycling at the MRF, these items could jam or slow the sorting process and may even endanger workers. Some examples include clothing, plastic film, hoses and cords that tangle in the equipment, large metal objects that damage equipment and syringes that can harm workers. Other items have little or no value, are too dirty to process or cannot be manufactured into something new.

Contaminants are costly to the MRF. Eventually, this cost could be passed on to your community because the contaminants must be sorted out and landfilled. That is why it is important to recycle properly. Many items that cannot be recycled at the MRF may be recyclable elsewhere. Learn more about contamination and wish-cycling.

Q6. If a resident moves to a different community, will the rules for recycling change again?

The District has developed a common list of recyclables that apply to every community in Cuyahoga County. While collection methods may look a little different from community to community, the materials that should be recycled are the same and include cans, cartons, glass, paper and cardboard along with plastic bottles and jugs.

Communities make their own rules when it comes to the type of recycling bin that is used and their collection set-out rules, but the materials that should be included in curbside recycling are the same across Cuyahoga County and also apply to many of our neighboring counties. That is because we all use the same three Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs) to process our collected recyclables.

Q7. What about recycling for other things that don't fall under the categories of cans, cartons, glass, paper and cardboard along with plastic bottles and jugs?

The District sponsors many special collections for what we call "Other Recycling," including household hazardous waste and electronics. Collections take place at the District headquarters as well as in most communities either year-round or on designated dates. Additionally, many charitable organizations accept donations of clothing and furniture. Search your items in the

Waste from remodeling projects can be taken to a construction debris landfill or a recycler. Plastic Bags and Film

Plastic Bags and Film

DO NOT put plastic bags and film in your curbside recycling. The bags tangle up in the recycling equipment at the Material Recovery Facility. Drop off at a grocery or retail store that offers a plastic bag collection bin.

Scrap Metal*

Do not place in curbside recycling. Appliances and other metal objects can be recycled through your community's bulky waste collection or local scrap metal recycler.

Shredded Paper

Do not place in your curbside recycling but recycle in a Paper Retriever[®] or River Valley Paper drop off bin. The green and yellow bins are located in the parking lots of schools, places of worship and nonprofit organizations.

Tires

When you buy new tires, recycle your old ones at the time of purchase and pay the small fee. Businesses with tires to dispose should contact the District for State of Ohio rules on tire transportation and disposal.

Q8. What about things that can't be recycled curbside or elsewhere?

Many items simply need proper disposal or should be landfilled. Here are some of the top items: Household Hazardous Waste

Properly dispose through your community's Household Hazardous Waste program. Items collected include oil-base paints, lawn and garden chemicals and automotive fluids. Find details for your community.

Medication

Do not flush or put down a drain. Unused or expired prescription medications can be safely disposed at special collection events or at police stations with a year-round Rx drop-box.

Needles and Sharps

Never place in your curbside recycling. Needles and sharps from home injections should be placed in a rigid plastic container such as a laundry detergent bottle then sealed securely and disposed with your trash.

Paint, Latex

Latex paint is not hazardous but should be dried out before disposing in your trash. Use cat litter, Oll-Dri or other absorbent product to harden the paint. Place solid paint cans in a trash bag before disposing.

Styrofoam[™]

Styrofoam[™] cups and containers are not recyclable. Dispose in your trash. Foam peanuts and some packing material can be dropped off for reuse at limited locations.

Trash

There are no solid waste landfills in Cuyahoga County. Excess trash can be hauled to a local waste transfer station.

Q9. Why do plastics have numbers inside recycling symbols if they're not recyclable?

The numbers on plastic containers are resin codes used by the plastics industry to identify the type of plastic chemicals used to make the container. It does not indicate whether that chemical compound can be manufactured into something new. So, not all plastics with the 1-7 symbol are recyclable. We no longer look at the number to determine if an item can be recycled.

Q10. Where should I direct our residents to learn more about recycling in our community?

The Solid Waste District provides recycling information for each of the 59 communities in Cuyahoga County. Learn about curbside recycling, special collections and other recycling programs for your community.

A RESIDENTS GUIDE TO TRASH AND RECYCLING

Dear Euclid Resident:

The City of Euclid is under contract with Kimble Recycling & Disposal for weekly automated collection/disposal of refuse and recyclable materials. Approved containers and informational materials were distributed to all residents receiving curbside pick-up. If you're a new resident and don't have the containers, please call (216) 289-2701, option #5. The following procedures are recommended to keep this program running smoothly.

- Place your Kimble trash & recycling totes and bundled refuse on the tree lawn between 6:00 pm the day before your collection and 7:00 am the day of your collection. If your trash is placed on the tree lawn any earlier, you will be in violation of Ordinance #941.05 which includes a fine.
- Collection may take place anytime between 7:00 am and 6:00 pm. Waste containers should not exceed 50 lbs. in weight. Empty waste containers are not permitted to remain in front of any building or residence in excess of twelve hours from the time of collection by the City.
- Kimble will not pick up trash from a business, even if it is operated out of a private residence.
- Recycling totes containing trash and/or contaminates will be tagged as unacceptable and not emptied.
 <u>Do not use recycling totes for excess solid waste (trash).</u>

For any questions or complaints, call the Service Department at (216) 289-2701.

Kimble does not operate on the following Holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, 4th of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

If a Holiday falls on a weekday, service for that day and the rest of the week will be delayed by one day. If a holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, your collection day will remain the same – no delay in service.



CURBSIDE TRASH PICK-UP

LARGE ITEMS Oversized items such as miscellaneous furniture and appliances, with or without refrigerants, will also be collected on your scheduled day. Remove the door(s) on anything that seals shut (i.e. refrigerator or freezer).

INSULIN NEEDLES The tips of the needles need to be broken off. Place needles in a sealed container (i.e. detergent bottle, coffee can) and place the container in trash tote – NOT recycling tote.

LAWNMOWERS/SNOWBLOWERS Kimble will pick these up curbside after you drain all of the gasoline/oil. Mark with a sign that all flammable liquid has been removed.

BRANCHES, BRUSH AND CARPETING must be cut into 3-4 foot lengths and bundled, not to exceed 2' in diameter. Weight should not exceed 50 pounds.

LATEX PAINT is not considered Hazardous Waste and will be picked up as long as it is solidified. Mix the remaining paint with dirt, sand or kitty litter. Once mixture hardens, place uncovered cans on tree lawn for pick-up.

MATTRESS/BOX SPRINGS Always need to be wrapped separately & completely sealed in plastic in order for Kimble to pick-up. This also applies to any furniture or bundled carpeting, if they contain bed bugs.

PLEASE NOTE: BUILDING OR CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS including concrete, dirt and roofing material WILL NOT be collected. These items must be disposed of by the resident. Separate arrangements to dispose of these materials should be made with a contractor at the homeowner's expense. See Other Recycling.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING

CURBSIDE RECYCLING Collection will take place weekly and will occur on the same day as your trash collection.

- Leave recyclables loose not bagged. Plastic bags do not belong in your curbside recycling tote.
- Recycle plastic shopping bags at many retail stores, including Giant Eagle, Lowe's, Marc's, Target & Walmart.
- Recyclables should be empty, rinsed clean and free from food residue.
- Boxes should be clean, dry, empty and FLAT.
- Putting the wrong items in your recycling will do more harm than good.

Also, Batteries+Bulbs, Mayfield Hts. location, (440) 449-5555. **PROPANE TANKS** 20# propane cylinders can be exchanged at the store where you purchase your new tank. Tanks can also be exchanged at AmeriGas, 37401 Stevens Blvd., Willoughby OH 44094, (440) 946-2000.



"What is the proper way to recycle?"

Combine the following core items in your curbside recycling container. Do not bag them. No other items should be placed in your recycling. And when in doubt, throw it out. The **CORE ITEMS**:



FAQs

"Why do plastics have numbers inside recycling symbols if they're not recyclable?"

The numbers on plastic containers are resin codes used by the plastics industry to identify the type of chemicals used to make the container. The codes do not always mean that the item is recyclable. Instead of looking at the numbers, look at the shape. If it's shaped like a bottle or jug with a neck that is narrower than the body, it can go in your recycling.

"What plastics CAN I recycle?"

Recycle plastic bottles, plastic tubs, and jugs. This includes items like water and soda bottles, shampoo bottles, milk, water and juice jugs, laundry detergent jugs and bleach bottles. Bottles and jugs should be emptied and rinsed. Replace the cap. Please support recycling by not putting other types of plastic into your recycling container. If you do, it will likely have to be sorted out as trash. This includes yogurt cups, takeout containers, berry and produce containers, etc.

"Why can't I recycle plastic bags?"

Plastic bags placed in the curbside recycling will wind around the sortation equipment at the recycling plant and are difficult and dangerous to remove. Instead, recycle plastic bags separately from your mixed recycling. Take them to a retail store or grocery store that has a separate recycling program for plastic bags. Better yet, skip the plastic and use reusable bags.
