Shred Day

Household Hazardous Waste Round-Up June 13 – June 24 & Sept 5 – Sept 16

The city will once again be conducting a household hazardous waste collection program in cooperation with the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District.

Residents wishing to participate in the program may bring unwanted pesticides, household chemicals, and oil-based paints to the Service Department between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday during any of the scheduled dates listed. There will also be a one-day Saturday drop off during each of the round-ups on March 27th, June 26th, and September 25th from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

Latex paint will not be accepted. Latex paint is not considered hazardous waste. It should be dried and disposed of in a solid state. For information on drying latex paint please contact the Service Department or visit our website.

Brush Collection: (April - June)

The Service Department will be conducting a spring brush collection during the months of April, May, and June. Residents are asked to observe the following guidelines:

Collections will be made Monday through Friday between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Residents are asked to contact the Service Department at 440-461-7266 in advance to schedule a pick up.

Branches can be of any length and need not be bundled, however, because the material will be loaded by hand, and due to equipment limitations, the size of the branches accepted will be limited to a maximum of 8" in diameter.

Root stumps up to a maximum weight of 60 pounds may be placed at the curb for collection. Larger stumps should be ground in place or disposed of by a private contractor.

To expedite collection, please place branches on your tree lawn with the cut end facing in the same direction, preferably downstream to the flow of traffic.

Beyond the program, brush may be tied and bundled in four-foot length for collection by our rubbish contractor year-round or, by special arrangements with the Service Department as time allows.

Computer Round-Up: April and August

The City will hold its first of two (2) computer roundup programs throughout the month of April. The program is in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District.

Items that can be recycled via this program includes desktops, towers, laptops, monitors, keyboards and peripherals, printers, modems, tablets, e-readers, telecom devices, networking equipment, cables, cell phones, and video game systems.

Residents wishing to participate in the program can drop off items at the Service Department between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday during the month of April. The Service department will package the items for delivery to the county for proper recycling and disposal.

A second round-up will be held in August.

2022 Construction Project Updates

Sandhurst Drive Overlay

An asphalt overlay will be performed on Sandhurst Dr. As part of the project, full depth concrete repairs as well as potential sidewalk replacements will be addressed within the Highland Woods Subdivision. The project is scheduled for a March bidding and April award, weather permitting. Work is anticipated to take place over the summer and into the early fall.

Lander Road Ext. Reconstruction & Widening

Lander Road Ext. reconstruction will entail the complete removal of the existing asphalt pavement and the installation of a new concrete roadway. Both north and southbound lanes will have curbing installed and be widened to 12.5' each. Additional work will include adding a storm sewer and enclosing the swale area on the west side of the road. As part of the project, drive aprons along the roadway and the asphalt sidewalk will both be replaced with new concrete. This project has a mid to late March bid date with an award in late April. Construction will span summer into the fall.

Wilson Mills /Bishop Road Intersection Improvement

This project is 90% complete. The contractor is waiting on delivery of the traffic mast arms, which are expected in March. Project completion is anticipated in the spring once the mast arms are installed, and final site restoration completed.

Street Striping

Traffic striping of the entire City including the Community Park and Municipal Complex area will begin in the spring.

Bidding will be in March and an award in April. The painting will begin as soon as weather is favorable. Please check the city's website for future updates on these and other projects.

Drainage Maintenance

With Spring just around the corner, the need for maintenance of drainage swales becomes an especially important part of our city's overall storm drainage system. While the service department can do its part to keep our storm sewers running freely by cleaning roadside catch basins and sweeping streets, we need the help and assistance of our residents to maintain roadside swales and swales on private property in rear and side yards.

Maintenance of rear and side yard swales are the responsibility of the property owner(s), although in some cases, a homeowner's association may have some role in maintenance. It is important to note that even if you do not have a catch basin in your yard; grass clippings, leaves, and debris that gather into ditches and swales can block the flow of rainwater and create trouble for your neighbors.

Please help your friends and neighbors by being good stewards of our storm sewer system.

DEPARTMENT UPDATES **DENNIS MATEJCIC - POLICE CHIEF**



Jail Inspection

On August 23, 2022, the Department had its annual Jail Inspection. Our department operates a State Certified twelve (12) Day Jail Facility that includes 7 full-service cells, a detox cell, visitor room and booking room. The Bureau of Detention authorizes three types of Jail Facilities in Ohio, temporary holding, twelve day and full service. The Bureau of Adult Detention has mandatory Minimum Jail Standards for our twelve-day facility regarding policies and procedures. Chief Dennis Matejcic and Jail Administrator Sergeant Sean Brown met with the State Jail Inspectors to determine new Standards that needed to be included in our training and policies in order to authorize state certification. We passed the inspection relating to 159 Jail Standards, without any deficiencies.

Fraud Advisory

We continue to see an increase of crime regarding fraudulent activity reported to our department.

We would like to remind you of the following things:

- NO legitimate company will ask you for payment in gift cards, meaning, the company will not ask you to go to a store and purchase gift cards, then ask you to read the serial numbers to them as a form of payment. This includes cable, cell phone, gas/oil, and electric companies. When in doubt, CALL US!
- NO Government Agency will ask you via telephone for your social security number.
- The I.R.S. DOES NOT have a warrant for your arrest.
- NO ONE needs your mobile banking passwords, including accounts linked to your checking account (i.e. Venmo or Cash App)
- NO ONE needs your Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, or TikTok passwords.


If you receive a telephone call out of the blue regarding an incarcerated family member needing cash immediately in order to be released, please do the following:

- 1. Call the family member directly.
- 2. Call the family and inform them of the situation.
- 3. Call the city, town, or state agency, in which the family member is allegedly incarcerated. 4. CALL US SO WE CAN VERIFY

Leaf Collection Program October 11 - December 9, 2022

The Service Department will begin continuous curbside leaf collection on all streets beginning on October 11th. Collection will be house by house and street by street. Once a cycle of all streets has



been completed (all streets have been collected), we will begin the cycle again.

Please place leaves on the tree lawn for collection, not in the street. Leaves placed in the street can be a hazard to motorists, can block drainage, and become wet and matted after a rain, which can significantly slow the collection process. Please do not mix in grass with the leaves. Grass should be prepared for trash collection or composted. Branches should be tied and bundled in four-foot lengths for trash collection or left loose and stacked separately away from leaf piles for collection by the service department.

The collection program will end the second week of December. The program end date is necessary to allow the service department time for equipment change over in preparation for snow removal operations.

Residents wishing to dispose of leaves beyond the cut off date may do so by composting their leaves or bagging them (40 pounds or less) for pick up by our rubbish contractor on their regular rubbish day.

Shred Day

The City will be hosting our second and final Shred Day of the year in October. The event will be held on Saturday October 29th from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Residents wishing to participate may bring materials to the Service Department where they will



be shredded on site. There is no need to remove clips or staples. Plastics are not accepted so we suggest that you bring your material in boxes or paper bags.

Mailboxes

As winter approaches, it is a good time to check the condition of your mailbox to be sure it can withstand the riggers of another harsh Northeast Ohio winter.

Here are some tips to consider:

 Inspect the post for damage or weakness do to age and rot.

- If the post is leaning towards the street due to age or the weight of a heavy box, straighten the post to gain at least 12" of clearance behind the curb line. This will allow for safe clearance from the overhang of a snowplow.
- To avoid damage and allow for better access, advise your snowplow contractor not to pile snow against the post.
- Consider installing a snow shield in the winter to protect your mailbox from snow damage when streets and driveways are being plowed. The service department can provide information on the construction and installation of snow shields.

If your mailbox is damaged, the Service Department can loan you a temporary mailbox and, in many cases, assist with repairs or installation of a new box. You can reach us at (440) 461-7266.

- No construction will be started until mid October
- Due to the time of year, only one of the above items will be completed in 2022 with the balance of the work completed in the spring of 2023.

A preconstruction meeting will be held in late September to discuss the project areas and timeline.

Notifications will be posted for affected residents prior to any construction taking place.



THANK YOU! I want to take this opportunity to say thank you to the community, our HHGTF members and the City of Highland Heights. In spite of challenges the past two plus years, our membership has remained strong. We have had successes in the area of environmental awareness over the past 12 years...and have hosted a number of great events. Probably the most popular has been the Freecycle/E-Waste drive. Over the past 12 years we have been fortunate to have approximately 80 speakers for our "Green Living Speaker Series"...all experts in their fields pertaining to environmental awareness and education.



On Sept. 7th, our speaker was Aaron Wilson, Atmospheric Scientist with the Ohio State University, awith the topic "Climate Change and What We Can Do." Aaron had a great many statistics for us, verifying that the climate is changing, and that there is a real and present danger due to the change. Although the climate has always changed, over the past 100 years or so, the changes are happening at an accelerated rate, and the common belief is that humans are contributing to this high rate of change. Here are some costs associated with natural disasters in Ohio, which are steadily on the increase:

FROM THE NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE:

2008-2017 Natural Disasters in Ohio

- Flash flooding: \$178,548,000 Heavy rain: \$126,000 Heavy snow: \$4,860,000 Tornadoes: \$196,559,000

Also information from Aaron: 2021 was the 6th warmest year since 1880. The top 10 warmest years have occurred since 2005, with the last seven years being the top 7 warmest (since 2015). And if you were born after February 1985, you have never experienced a cooler than average month for the planet.

With a climate that is becoming warmer comes sustained heat stress on humans and livestock, along with lower food productivity and reduced quality. The scientific community agrees that we should have acted on this decades ago, but there are still steps that we, as individuals, can take to help.... following are some of Aaron's tips for action:

TAKE ACTION IN YOUR BACKYARD and COMMUNITY:

- Improve your energy efficiency
- Reduce the use of gasoline-powered yard tools
- Reduce the threat of invasive species expansion, choose plants that are native which require less resources
- Reduce water consumption
- Compost kitchen and garden waste
- Plant lots of trees to absorb carbon dioxide

You can also plan car trips so that we are driving less. When the need comes to replace appliances, look for the most energy efficient. Reduce the use of plastics, choosing more environmentally friendly alternatives such as glass that can be recycled indefinitely.



Hunting Valley Recycling Update

Dear residents

As the fall air grows cooler and changing leaves paint the valley, we thought the timing was perfect to **recap our recycling progress**, answer questions and share additional aids for your recycling efforts.

To begin, we completed another **Shredding Day** in September by collecting 2,750 pounds of material, a 37% increase over last year. Twenty residents participated. Village Hall also extensively uses Shredding Day for the police, building department and other administration. Next year we hope to see even more residents participate as it is a very professional and helpful free service!

In addition, the **paper dumpster** continues to be an important component of our recycling efforts. The dumpster is located in



the service area, across from the garage, and is very easy to find. For 2022, usage is up 16%, and since the inception of the program, the dumpster has collected paper equivalent to 159 trees.

Second, the website update is underway thanks to Sherri Gambrill and Maddy Mavec. **We need to complete the recycling section** to include both videos and photos from our "deep dive" event, links to other sites, as well as important recycling information, news and special projects.



Third, we held a recycling "deep dive" at Village Hall in July to determine to learn new best practices. Residents Jim Hickey, Maddy Mavec, Ellen Resnick, Bobbi Pincus, Teri Koslen and Harry Hawkes as well as Kris Tesor and Judy Neuger (Moreland Hills) were joined by Vince Crawford (Waste Management) to analyze recycling from 10 residents. We sorted the recycling by material types with a pile for contamination.

Overall, based on the sample, we appear to be doing a very good job with

contamination ... Per Vince Crawford "The overall message to the community is very positive, I wish more of our communities were as good as Hunting Valley for lowering contamination." The focus for recycling is on weight so getting the big heavy items correct is most important. "For the sample inspected, less than 10% was contaminated, especially when recognizing a lot of the cardboard is being collected via the paper dumpster." The industry average is about 25%.

But we can't let one sample temper our attempts to be even better. We learned a many new best practices based on a better understanding of the recycling process (that uses conveyors supported by automated and human sorting) and the underlying economics for recycled products that has dynamic, highly fluctuating pricing, is market specific (e.g., Midwest) and is based on clean recycling streams of products. Please see the following pages and attached handout for details. In addition, when you go to village hall for voting, you will find excellent recycling information from the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District (CCSWD). If you unable to make that day, please contact Sherri for the materials.

Lessons Learned from Recycling Deep Dive

- 1. Eliminate broken glass

Fourth, in response to our survey last fall, many residents requested that recycling be collected weekly ... "we have a family of 4 and our bin is full in a week" and "our household creates more recycling than garbage some weeks." We appreciate the challenge and recommend a few strategies. First, the committee has come to the realization that "the more we know, the less we put into curbside recycling." Many of us were recycling the wrong items, sometimes the wrong way, and that reviewing the educational material with all family members and using the CCSWD website may decrease your volume. Also, many residents use the paper dumpster for cardboard, which quickly fills up totes. Lastly, if you still have too much recycling, Don can provide an extra dumpster for a nominal charge.

In response to other comments, If you do not have recycling stickers on your recycling totes, please contact Don and he will give you a new one! One resident recommended we investigate using a waste-to-energy plant that combusts waste to create energy for the power grid. Per CCSWD, for Ohio, the closest facility is operated by Covanta in Indianapolis Indiana, a distance too far to truck. Building a plant is very expensive and requires passing many regulatory hurdles. Also, we have low-cost landfill in Ohio, so the business case is weak. If still interested, we recommend residents contact state officials and the local EPA office. Lastly, another resident suggested we provide more options for recycling at Village Hall. Currently, our program is extensive and one of the best, but we agree the usage should be higher. The Moreland Hills Greening the Hills event has been very successful. For 2 days a year they provide collection services for what we typically collect all year at the service department. We are considering that type of event to increase our volumes. We all benefit from a deadline!

Lessons learned from Recycling Deep Dive

Lesson Learned	Details
1. Eliminate broken glass	 Broken glass clogs machines and hurts workers. It is dangerous! So broken glass should never be put into recycling at home Amazingly, very little glass is broken during collection and sorting if it is the right type (e.g., bottles and jars with thicker walls) Most drinking glasses will not make it safely through the process
2. No plastic bags, flimsy plastic and tin foil	 Plastic bags are the #1 problem and source of contamination in recycling centers Plastic bags, plastic 6 pack holders, bubble wrap, berry containers, saran wrap, etc. get caught in the conveyor belts and rollers, stopping the sorting process. They also mix in with other materials, reducing their value to recyclers Other flimsy items such as tin foil and take out containers will not make it through the process, and are often dirty Check with your local grocery story for collection or go to plasticfilmrecycling.org for other options
3. Keep small items out	 Smaller items are too small to be sorted and jam equipment Smaller than a credit card? NOT recyclable. That includes: straws, coffee pods, plastic cutlery, paperclips, loose caps or lids and a million other tiny things in our daily lives It is ok to recycle small caps if left on the bottle and tops to cans if still attached. CURBSIDE RECYCLING / TRASH COLLECTION

PICK UP DAY / TIME:

Collected by Republic Services (440-458-5191). Household trash should be set out for collection no later than 6:00am Monday morning. Although recyclable materials should be placed at the same time as trash, recyclables may be picked up at a different time on that day.

WEIGHT AND SIZE LIMIT:

Household trash should be placed in a trash container (95 gallons maximum) or bagged; and not exceed 50 lbs. in weight. Please place containers and bags within five feet of the curb.

DELAYED PICK UP INFO:

Due to holiday schedules, recycling/trash pick up will be on Tuesdays after the following 2022 holidays:

- Memorial Day
- Labor Day
- Independence Day
- Christmas Day

CURBSIDE RECYCLING:

Collected by Republic Services (440-458-5191). Cut your trash in half when you combine paper, cans, cartons, and glass along with plastic bottles, jars, jugs, and tubs in your Curbside Recycling. It's simple and easy, Learn more at CuyahogaRecycles.org.

- Place loose, not bagged, items in your recycling bin
- Empty and rinse food and beverage containers
- Replace caps on bottles, jars, and jugs
- Flatten cardboard boxes

OTHER RECYCLING:

These items can be recycled, reused, or donated elsewhere, but not as part of our Curbside Recycling; construction materials, clothing, computers/

electronics, fluorescent bulbs, household goods, household hazardous waste, plastic bags, shredded paper, tires, propane tanks, packing peanuts, and scrap metal. Please visit CuyahogaRecycles.org for more information.

PROPER DISPOSAL:

Some items require special handling before disposal: needles, medications, household hazardous waste, and fluorescent bulbs. Latex paint can be dried with kitty litter and disposed of as part of your regular weekly curbside trash collection. Please visit CuyahogaRecycles.org for more information.

NON-RECYCLABLE ITEMS:

Not everything can be recycled. These items still go in your weekly trash collection: Styrofoam containers, durable plastics, cups, lids, utensils, broken ceramics, hoses, ropes, etc. Visit **CuyahogaRecycles.org** to learn more about how to recycle and dispose of the items listed above.

RESIDENT SHRED DAYS

Drop off at the Middleburg Heights Service Center.

- Saturday, June 4, 2022, 9:00am 12:00pm
- Saturday, October 22, 2022, 9:00am 12:00pm

There is no charge for this service, but drop-offs are limited to 2 banker boxes per household. Shredded documents are transferred to a recycling facility where they return to the marketplace in the form of recycled household paper products. Most financial, legal documents, receipts, tax, medical records, floppy disks, and CDs are accepted.

BULK WASTE COLLECTION

These items will be collected as part of your regular curbside trash collection if properly placed for pickup: household appliances, furniture, carpeting (separated from padding), hedge cuttings, limbs, branches, tables, dismantled swing sets/play equipment, mattresses

(must be bagged), and refrigerators/freezers (doors and Freon removed). Loose items should be securely tied, not exceed four feet in length, and not exceed 50 pounds in weight. Middleburg Heights residents may also use the City dumpsters located at the Service Center. Year-round dumpsters access is available every Wednesday and Friday, 8:00am - 3:00pm, and the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of each month, April 16 - October 15. Please have proper identification available upon request.

REFRIGERANT / FREON REMOVAL:

Refrigerators, freezers, air-conditioners, dehumidifiers, etc. require a certified contractor to remove the refrigerant and the appliance must be tagged to indicate this removal before these items can be placed on the curb for removal. Additionally, please remember to remove the refrigerator and freezer doors.

LIMB AND BRANCH REMOVAL



Limbs and branches will be picked up from residential properties on a weekly basis year-round. Limbs and branches should be cut into manageable lengths and neatly stacked on the tree lawn. Please place any limbs or branches on your tree lawn by 7:00am on Monday of each week. The intent of this program is to collect and recycle residential yard waste and storm damage. Commercial contractors working on private property are responsible for disposal of all debris associated with the removal of any trees, limbs, or brush.

TIRE DISPOSAL COLLECTION



Drop off at the Middleburg Heights Service Center.

Middleburg Heights residents may drop off unwanted passenger vehicle tires at the Middleburg Heights Service Center on Wednesdays and Fridays from 8:00am - 3:00pm. Please have proper identification

COMPUTER RECYCLING

Household computer equipment such as CPUs, monitors, keyboards, mice, printers, terminals, modems, software, other peripheral devices, and accessories may be taken to our City Service Center. Middleburg Heights residents only, year-round on Wednesdays and Fridays, 8:00am - 3:00pm, and the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of each month, April 16 - October 15. Television and other electronics are not accepted. For more information on how to recycle or dispose of other electronics, please visit www. cuyahogarecycles.org.

FALL LEAF PICK UP



Leaf pick up will begin in October for Middleburg Heights residents and will continue into December if weather permits.

Residents can expect to receive a pick up every seven to ten days. At least four city-wide, full-service pick ups will be made throughout the season.







Tips to Recycle Right

- 1. Leave recyclables loose not bagged. Plastic bags do not belong in your recycling cart. Plastic bags get tangled in the sorting machines at the recycling facilities and cause major problems for the recycling process. Plastic shopping bags can be recycled at many retail locations.
- 2. Make sure it's clean and empty. Rinse residue from cartons, containers, bottles and jars or any other recyclable that may contain food particles. Greasy pizza boxes are not accepted.
- 3. Keep it dry. When it comes to paper and cardboard, keeping it dry is imperative for the recycling process.
- 4. Don't wishcycle. Recycling only these five core items is paramount: cans, cartons, glass bottles and jars, paper and boxes, along with plastic bottles, jugs and tubs.

OTHER RECYCLING:

It's important to recycle correctly. Some items don't belong in your curbside recycling. Many items can be recycled, reused or donated elsewhere.



Shredded Paper

Place in a paper bag and drop off at Paper Retriever or River Valley Paper recycling bins. Typically located in parking lots of schools, churches and community centers.



Propane Tanks

Recycle unwanted 20-lb. grill tanks by writing "RECYCLE" on the tank and taking it to any Blue Rhino location. Non-Rhino brands included



Plastic Bags

Plastic bags are the most common item found in landfills. In an effort to reduce this, many local retail stores offer plastic bag recycling. Check with your local store.



Holiday Lights

During Christmas Season, retailers have collection bins for holiday lights. Check with your local store.



Construction Materials

Consider donating construction materials.
Otherwise take materials to private facility for a fee.



Tires

When you buy new tires, recycle your old tires through your tire retailer at the time of purchase. If you already have tires at home, contact a local tire store for disposal options. There are no free disposal options for tires.

WHAT NEEDS PROPER DISPOSAL:

Not everything can be recycled. These items still have to be properly disposed.



Latex Paint

Any paint that is LATEX should be dried out (add kitty litter, sawdust, etc.) and placed with the lid off in your regular trash.



Fluorescent Bulbs

Compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) and high-intensity discharge (HID) can be recycled at Home Depot, Lowes and Batteries+Bulbs. Check with your local store. Residents can also contact the Solid Waste District for alternate disposal options.



Needles

Place needles in a rigid plastic container (detergent, milk jug, etc.), mark "SHARPS", tape lid shut and place with regular trash.



Medications

The North Royalton Police Department offers 24/7 drop-off for prescription pills, tablets and capsules in the Police Station Lobby. Needles, syringes and liquid medications are not accepted.



Batteries

Primary/single-use alkaline batteries can be put in the regular trash. Rechargeable batteries can be recycled for free at many local retail electronic and hardware stores.

Curbside Service Guidelines For North Royalton Residents

General Service Guidelines

Trash and recycling collection is provided by the City through a contract with Rumpke Waste and Recycling. Included with this contract, Rumpke provides a 65-gallon green recycling cart. The recycling cart should remain at the residence as it is the property of Rumpke and the serial number on the container coordinates with the residence address.

Residents are required to supply their own trash bags or cans. Trash cans must be equipped with lifting handles and shall not exceed 36-gallon capacity. Trash bags and cans cannot exceed 50 pounds in weight when filled. Residents have the option to rent a trash cart from Rumpke by contacting them directly at 800-828-8171.

Trash and recycling must be placed at the street line the evening before or by 7 a.m. on your designated service day. All emptied containers must be removed from the street line and returned to their place of storage on the same day as your designated service day. (City Code 1060.01)

The City does not provide any trash and recycling pick-up services to apartments.

Bulky Items

Rumpke will pick up acceptable bulky items weekly on your designated service day. Residents should notify of a bulky item the day prior to their regular service day by contacting the North Royalton Service Department at (440) 582-3002 by 4:30 p.m.

Examples of bulky items: appliances, TVs, carpet, furniture and large toys.

NO DELAY

All mattresses, box springs and other upholstered items, fabric and leather, must be wrapped in plastic. Carpet must be cut to 4-foot lengths, rolled and bundled. Items should not weigh more than 50 pounds. Any item longer than 4-foot and/or weighing more than 50 pounds must be broken down. All glass must be taped.

Consider donating gently-used clothing, furniture, mattresses and box springs, and appliances to organizations such as The Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity, Cleveland Furniture Bank and Goodwill.

Christmas Trees

Sunday, January 1, 2023

Christmas tree pickup will occur the first two weeks after the New Year's holiday. All Christmas trees must be cut into 4-foot lengths.

2022 Holiday Collection Schedule

Rumpke only observes the following holidays.

Trash collection will not be delayed on any other holiday.

Yard Waste Guidelines

Curbside Pickup and Drop-Off

- Acceptable yard waste items include:
- Grass clippings and leaves (must be contained in paper or plastic bags)
- Small tree branches and bush branches (must be cut to 4-foot lengths and bundled weighing less than 50 lbs.)

Unacceptable yard waste items include:

- No loose or unbagged materials
- No commercial material or items from businesses
- No stumps, root balls or wood from tree removals
- No construction material from large garden or landscaping projects

This service is for routine yard maintenance only. If you have large amounts of yard waste, you must take it to a yard waste facility. Hours, prices and specifications are determined by the facility.

Computers and Electronics

Desktops, towers, laptops, monitors, keyboards and peripherals, printers, modems, tablets, e-readers, telecom devices, networking equipment, cables, cell phones video game systems and ink cartridges.



Scrap Metal

Steel, stainless steel, copper, brass and aluminum.



Household Hazardous Waste

Oil or solvent based paints, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids), varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs, paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine, pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, caustic household cleaners, pool chemicals, cooking oils and grease, adhesives, roof tar, driveway sealer, kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid and mercury.



Holiday Lights

Light strands and power cords, Bring items loose, no bagged items accepted.

During months of November and December ONLY.
